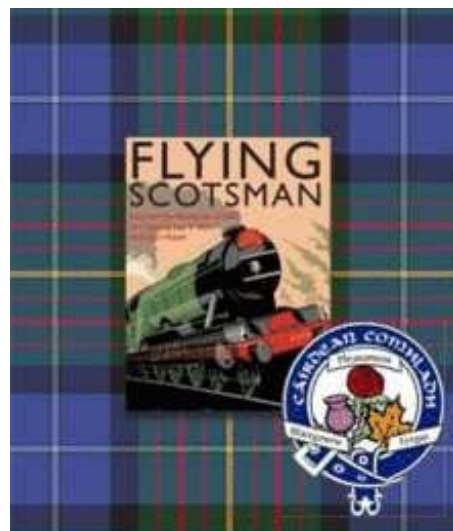
PBFSCO Flying Scotsman

Barley Pudding

Barley crops up in a number of Scottish traditional recipes - from barley bannocks to malt whisky. Barley provides a distinctive flavour which comes through in this simple recipe

Ingredients:

8 ounces (225g or a generous US cupfull) barley
3 ounces (75g or one-third cup) currants
3 ounces (75g or one-third cup) raisins
1¾ pints (1 litre or 4¼ cups) water
Pinch of salt
Caster (superfine) sugar and single (light) cream to serve

Method:

Mix the barley and water in a heavy-based saucepan and bring slowly to the boil. Simmer for one-and-a-half hours, stirring occasionally.

Add the currants, raisins and salt and simmer for another 15 minutes.

Serve sprinkled with caster (superfine) sugar and the cream.

A Brief History of Gowf

In 1421 it is noted that three individuals brought golf to Scotland. Hugh Kennedy, Robert Stewart, and John Smale are identified and credited with this honor.

However, because golf threatened the skill and sport of archery, in 1457 the Scots Parliament of James II banned it (along with the European version of football) on certain days of the week. Gowf (as it was known) could no longer be played on Sundays since, even way back when, it interfered with military training. Scotland was at war, on and off, with the English, and soldiers apparently were skipping military practice for a quick game.

This Sunday ban stayed in place, and in fact was "reaffirmed" by the next two monarchs all the way up to the early 1500s. However, finally, when the Scottish and English signed the Treaty of Glasgow in 1502, the ban on golf was lifted. It is interesting to note that upon the lifting of that ban, James IV is reported to have made the first purchase of golf equipment – a set of golf clubs.

Though golf remained mostly a game for the elite, by 1527 the common man took up the game. Sir Robert Maule is attributed as the first "commoner" to play a round on Barry Links, Angus. The first female golfer is said to have been Mary Queen of Scots. Her first golf game was played in 1567 shortly after the death of her husband.

Even way back when, nothing interfered with that round of golf. In 1641, Charles I while playing a round of golf at Leith, received word of the Irish rebellion (which marked the beginning of the English Civil War). True to form, he finishes his game before heading off to plan his military strategy.

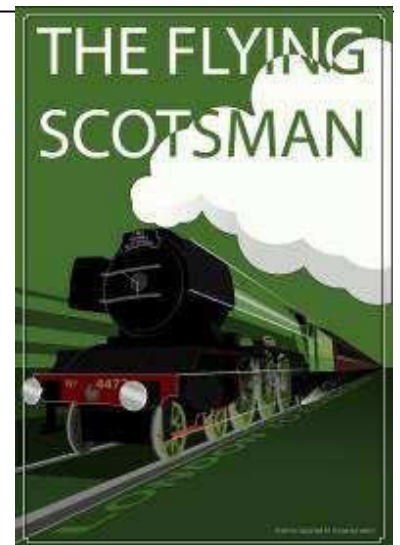
Flying Scotsman, Be Taken for a Ride

It is really wonderful to have so many new members join South Bay Scottish Society this year and we are very happy to have you with us! We have many fun and exciting events scheduled for this year!!!

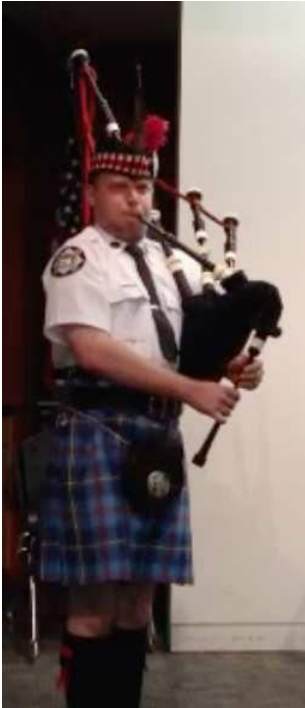

The quarterly gathering began with pot-luck dinner. This gives everyone a chance to enjoy the company of old and new friends with celtic interests. The brief business of the evening included discussing the upcoming events of the Niles Canyon Flying Scotsman Railroad, Golf at Blackberry Farm, and Miniature Golf in Sunnyvale. The announcement of the next General Meeting on July 12th's entertainment drew enthusiasm for a sing-a-long, and Karaoke: Scottish Style. (See article pg7)

The Entertainment for the evening, was a dapper young gentleman, by the name of Josh Agee from Santa Clara County Sheriff's Pipes & Drums. He informed us that the band performs in various community events throughout the Bay Area. It is comprised of both civilian volunteers from the local community and surrounding law enforcement agencies. The Band has grown to its current size of 40 plus volunteers, with members ranging in age from 14 to 80. Approximately two thirds of the band are pipers; one third are drummers. Over the past few years, the Band has performed an average of 45 events per year including Veteran's Day Parades, Fallen Peace Officer Memorials, and Pleasanton Scottish Highland Gathering and Games.

Josh then gave us a beautiful demonstration on the bagpipes. The fine acoustic design of the library and volume of the instrument filled our ears sweet music. Between songs, Josh fielded questions from the audience. When asked about his early training, we were pleased to learn that his first teacher was none other than our own Alan Keith, past Board member. Alan humbly paraphrased DaVinci and stated "That the student has surpassed his teacher". Alan gave a short history of the bagpipes before accompanying Josh on the bodhran drum for the last few songs.

Thanks again to Josh and Alan for entertaining us and all the members of the South Bay Scottish Society for attending.

The History of Scotland and Trains

Being Scottish I have a very strong love of trains – I'm especially nostalgic about the old steam trains. I remember standing on the railway bridge watching the trains leaving the station with puffs of smoke and whistles blowing. People who lived along the train route had to make sure to bring in their clean washing (laundry) before the train passed or it would be covered in soot - it was accepted as a way of life. While I was growing up in Scotland I saw the transition from old steam trains to diesel locomotives and used them regularly as a means of transport. Even today, most people in Scotland do not drive so they still make use of buses and trains as a means of daily transportation. Graeme, my oldest son, has loved trains since he was very young and is now a member of two Railroad Societies 'Diablo Pacific Short Line' and BAGRS (Bay Area Garden Railroad Society). Since it seems a natural progression for SBSS and the train societies to get together for some events we wanted to give our members some information:



Diablo Pacific Short Line www.shortline.org

Originally part of the Bay Area Garden Railroad Society (BAGRS), the Diablo Pacific Short Line (DPSL) is an all-volunteer organization which operates a portable, large-scale model railroad. The goals of the DPSL are to promote the hobby of model railroading and to educate the public regarding the importance of railroads, railroad history, and train safety. Although each module is individually constructed with unique themes or scenery, the rails are designed to interlock with other modules to support various layout configurations depending on space available. Powered by electrical controls, the trains represent steam locomotives of the late 19th through the middle 20th century and diesels and electric locomotives of the '40s and '50s until the current era.

BAGRS Live Steam layout is set up at many different events throughout the year. During these events, the BAGRS members provide an introduction to the small-scale live steam model railroading and garden railroading.

Running on actual steam power, these small-scale live steam engines use a variety of different fuels to heat the water in the boiler. Typically, these steam engines use: alcohol, butane, coal, or gelled fuel (commonly known as Sterno). While this leads to more complexity than electric model locomotives, operating live steamers is much less complicated than driving a car once you have learnt the basics. As a whole, small-scale live steam model railroading is a fun hobby which provides hours of learning both indoors and out.



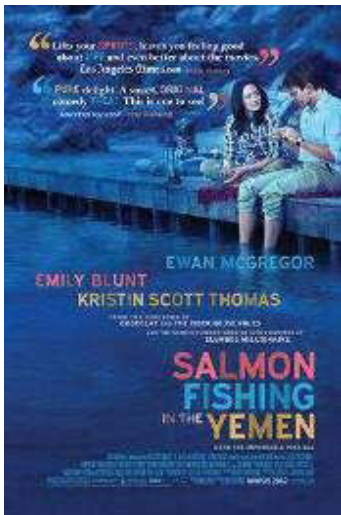

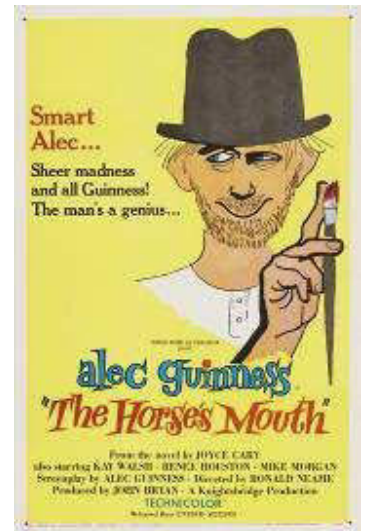
